

Command Sergeant Major Jeffrey M. Williams

Command Sergeant Major Jeffrey M. Williams entered the Army August 13, 1986 and completed Basic and Advanced Individual Training as a cannon crewmember at Fort Sill, Okla. He reclassified as a chemical operations specialist in 1994, and again, as a unit supply specialist in 1997.

Williams served as an ammunition sergeant, nuclear, biological, and chemical committee instructor, supply sergeant, unit supply specialist [92Y] and noncommissioned officer education system instructor/writer, brigade senior supply sergeant, 92Y MOSQ and NCOES chief instructor, senior military advisor for operations, first sergeant, and senior enlisted leader.

Williams' previous assignments include 1/86th Field Artillery, 1/417th Training Support Battalion, 76th Division (Institutional Training), 1/391st Training Support Battalion, 98th Division (Institutional Training), 10/98th Quartermaster, 98th Division (IT), Multinational Security Transition Command – Iraq, 8/80th Quartermaster, 80th Training Command, 1/391st Training Support Battalion, 104th Division (Leadership Training), and United States Army European Command Area Reserve Element.

Williams' military and civilian education includes all levels of the Noncommissioned Officer Education System, First Sergeant Course, Total Army Instructor Trainer Course, and Small Group Instructor Trainer Course. He has a Bachelor of Science Degree in Business Administration from Husson College and a Master of Public Administration from the University of Maine.
